Curriculum Vitae of Hon'ble Ms. Kuniko Ozaki

Hon'ble Ms. Kuniko Ozaki is presently Judge of the International Criminal Court elected from the Asian Group of States. Judge Kuniko Ozaki (1956) has worked extensively for the Japanese government in a number of positions in Foreign and Justice Ministries, including Special Assistant to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ambassador in charge of the Convention on Biological Diversity, Director for Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs and Specialist to the Criminal Affairs Division. As Director for Treaty Affairs for the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNDOC) she was responsible for assisting States in the ratification and implementation of relevant international treaties as well as the development of domestic legislation on organized crime, corruption and terrorism; the training of judges and prosecutors in developing countries; and the establishment of the rule of law and national criminal justice systems in post-conflict regions. As Minister of the Permanent Mission of Japan in Vienna, Judge Ozaki covered non-proliferation issues and was in charge of the negotiations to revise the Convention on the Physical Protection of Nuclear Material. Using her vast experience as an academic lawyer, Judge Ozaki has also undertaken research and taught at the Tohoku University Graduate School of Law and at the Kobe University Graduate School specializing in international criminal law, humanitarian law and human rights law, including war crimes, crimes against humanity, terrorism, and organized crime and corruption, amongst others.
